2002-2003 Season Wrap

SONOS completed its third successful season with a chamber orchestra concert presented by Music at Holy Trinity at 316 East 88th Street in New York City. An extremely enthusiastic and supportive audience of approximately 300 people came to experience SONOS first hand. The concert was a perfect example of SONOS' style: performing a world premiere commission by Brooklyn composer Brian Grundstrom, and collaborating with the such esteemed artists as the New York Guitar Quartet, soprano Sherry Zannoth and organist Stephen Hamilton.

Our first fundraising campaign was met with a positive response of over \$12,000! Ticket sales for the concert brought in a little over \$2,000 which allowed us to keep the 2002-2003 season operating in the black! The latest list of Donors can be found on the back of this newsletter.

SONOS performed Vivaldi's *Gloria* with the Blair Academy Concert Choir (NJ) on May 4th, 2003. We plan to continue this collaborative relationship with Blair.

The concert, produced by Finlandia Foundation New York Metropolitan Chapter in association with the Sibelius Society U.S.A., will feature music by four of Finland's greatest composers: Jean Sibelius, Einojuhani Rautavaara, Aulis Sallinen and Pehr Henrik Nordgren, including two North American premieres. The Ostrobothnians will also perform the Chamber Symphony of Dmitri Shostakovich.
